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STATEWIDE ELECTIVE EXECUTIVE WOMEN 2011

In 2011, 71 women hold statewide elective executive offices across the country; women hold 22.4% of the 317 available positions.* Among these women 39 are Democrats, 31 are Republicans, and 1 was elected in a nonpartisan race.

To date, women have been elected statewide to executive offices in 49 of the nation's 50 states. In Maine, the governor is the only executive elected statewide, and a woman has never served as governor there.

GOVERNORS

Six women (2D, 4R) serve as governors in 2011.

Jan Brewer, an Arizona Republican, in 2010 was elected to a full term. She became governor by constitutional succession when Janet Napolitano resigned to become Secretary of the Department of Homeland Security. Brewer was elected secretary of state in 2002 and 2006. She served as Maricopa County supervisor from 1997 to 2002. She served in Arizona's State Senate and House of Representatives from 1983 to 1996.

Mary Fallin, an Oklahoma Republican, won an open gubernatorial seat in 2010. She served as U.S. Representative from 2007-2011. She was lieutenant governor from 1995 to 2007 and served in the Oklahoma House of Representatives from 1990 to 1994.

Christine Gregoire, a Washington Democrat, won a very close race in 2004 for an open gubernatorial seat. She was first elected attorney general in 1992 and re-elected in 1996 and 2000. An attorney, she served as director of Washington State's Department of Ecology.

Nikki Haley a South Carolina Republican, won an open gubernatorial seat in 2010. She served in the South Carolina House of Representatives from 2005 to 2011. She served as majority whip from 2007 to 2011. She was assistant executive director, Lexington Medical Center Foundation. She served as a major in the Civil Air Patrol. She owns a business with her family.

Susana Martinez, a New Mexico Republican, won an open gubernatorial seat in 2010. She was elected the Dona Ana County District Attorney, serving from 1996 to 2009.

Beverly M. Perdue, a North Carolina Democrat, won an open gubernatorial seat in 2008. She was elected lieutenant governor in 2000 and 2004. She served in the North Carolina State Senate and House of Representatives from 1987 to 1999. She was a public school teacher and served as director of geriatric services at a community hospital. She holds a Ph.D. in education administration.

HISTORY OF WOMEN GOVERNORS

Thirty-four women (19D,15R) have served as governors in 26 states. In addition, one woman has served as governor in Puerto Rico. Arizona is the first state where a woman succeeded another woman as governor, and the first state to have had four women governors. Of the 34 women governors, 23 were first elected in their own right; 3 replaced their husbands, and 8 became governor by constitutional succession, three of whom subsequently won a full term. The record number of women serving simultaneously, achieved in 2004 and again in 2007, is 9.

Martha Layne Collins (D-KY)	1984-1987	
Madeleine Kunin (D-VT)	1985-1991	First and only woman to serve three terms as governor.
Kay Orr (R-NE)	1987-1991	First Republican woman governor and first woman to defeat another woman in a gubernatorial race.
Rose Mofford (D-AZ)	1988-1991	Elected as secretary of state, succeeded governor who was impeached and convicted.
Joan Finney (D-KS)	1991-1995	First woman to defeat an incumbent governor.

Nancy Hollister (R-OH)	1998-1999	Elected lieutenant governor; served as governor for 11 days when predecessor took U.S. Senate seat and successor had not yet been sworn in.
Jane Swift (R-MA)	2001-2003	Elected as lieutenant governor, succeeded governor who resigned for an ambassadorial appointment.

Sila Calderon (Popular Democratic Party-PR)	2001-2005	Former mayor of San Juan, first woman governor of Puerto Rico.

Olene Walker (R-UT)	2003-2005	Elected as lieutenant governor, succeeded governor who resigned to take a federal appointment.

Kathleen Sebelius (D-KS)	2003-2009	Father was governor of Ohio. Resigned to become U.S. Secretary of Health and Human Services.
