

WOMEN IN NEW JERSEY GOVERNMENT

CONGRESS Bonnie Watson Coleman (D-12), elected in 2014, is the first woman elected to Congress from New Jersey since 2003. New Jersey has sent a total of six women (3D, 3R) to the U.S. House of Representatives and no women to the U.S. Senate. The New Jersey congresswomen who previously served were:

STATEWIDE In 2018, **Sheila Oliver** (D) took office as New Jersey's second lieutenant governor, a newly-created position. She was the first Black woman election to statewide office in NJ. In New Jersey, the governor and lieutenant governor, elected together, are the only statewide elected officials. **Christine Todd Whitman**, New Jersey's first (and to date, only) woman governor, served from 1994-2001.

CABINET MEMBERS Governor Phil Murphy has eleven women in his cabinet. This represents 52.4% of his 21-member cabinet.

STATE LEGISLATURE In 2018, **37** women serve in New Jersey's state legislature, holding **30.8%** of the 120 available seats. Nationally women hold **25.4%** of all state legislative seats; New Jersey ranks 13th among the 50 states in the proportion of women serving in its legislature. Women of color make up 51.4% of all women in the New Jersey legislature: 60% of women in the Senate and 48.1% of women in the Assembly.

Senate In 2018, of the 40 (25D, 15R) seats in the New Jersey State Senate, **10** are held by women (25.0%). Eight are Democrats and two are Republicans:

Loretta Weinberg serves as the Senate majority leader and M. Teresa Ruiz serves as Senate president pro tempore. Three Black women (Cunningham, Gill, and Turner) and three Latinas (Cruz-Perez, Pou and Ruiz) currently serve in the New Jersey Senate.

Assembly In 2018, of the 80 (54D, 26R) members of the State Assembly, **27**, or **33.8%**, are women. Twenty-one are Democrats and six are Republicans:

Five Latinas (Chaparro, Jimenez, Lopez, Mosquera, and Quijano) and eight Black women (Carter, Jasey, McKnight, Reynolds-Jackson, Speight, Sumter, Timberlake, and Tucker) currently serve in the Assembly.

Sheila Y. Oliver (D), served as speaker of the Assembly from 2011-2013. Oliver is only the second Black woman in the nation to serve as a speaker of a lower house. One woman previously served as speaker of the New Jersey Assembly. **Marion West Higgins** (R) became speaker in 1965, only the third woman in the nation to be speaker of a state house. She served as acting governor on occasion when Governor Richard Hughes traveled out of state.

COUNTY EXECUTIVES In 2018, among the five counties in New Jersey that elect executives, no woman holds that title.

COUNTY FREEHOLDERS In 2018, **38**, or **28.1%**, of the 135 (82D, 51R, two vacancies) county freeholders in New Jersey are women; five women serve as freeholder chairs, directors or presidents. Women serve as freeholders in 20 of the state's 21 counties; 24 Democrats and 14 Republicans currently serve. The one county with no women freeholders is Warren.

COUNTY CONSTITUTIONAL OFFICERS In 2018, **22** women serve as elected constitutional officers in New Jersey's counties. They hold 33.8% of the 65 available positions. These women officials include: 10 county clerks, 2 registers, 2 sheriffs and 8 surrogates.

STATE SUPREME COURT Two women currently serve on New Jersey's seven-member Supreme Court: Justice Jaynee LaVecchia, appointed by Governor Christine Todd Whitman and sworn in on January 26, 2000 and Justice Anne Patterson, appointed by Governor Chris Christie and sworn in on September 1, 2011.

The first woman to head New Jersey's highest court was Chief Justice Deborah Poritz; appointed by Governor Whitman, she served from 1996 until she retired in 2006. Whitman also appointed Justice Virginia Long, who served from September 14, 1999 until she retired in March, 2012. Governor Jon Corzine appointed Justice Helen E. Hoens, who served from October 26, 2006 until October 26, 2013. Judge Mary Catherine Cuff was assigned temporarily to serve on the Court by Chief Justice Stuart Rabner in October 2012. The first woman member of New Jersey's Supreme Court was Justice Marie L. Garibaldi, who was appointed by Governor Thomas Kean and served from 1982 until 2000.

WOMEN IN THE STATE PARTIES **Democrats:** The chair of the New Jersey Democratic State Committee is a man (John Currie). In the 21 counties, five women serve as county chairs:
