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NJ Women Now Hold Record Number of Assembly Seats; Elections Could Mean Even Greater Gains

With the swearing in of two new assemblywomen this week, New Jersey has jumped to 28th among the states when ranked by proportion of women lawmakers, according to the Center for American Women and Politics (CAWP). A record number of women candidates in the 2007 legislative elections offers the prospect of additional gains in a state long noted for its poor record in electing women.

The two new women – Assemblywomen Elease Evans (D-35) and Mila Jasey (D-27) – were named to open seats created by resignations of two men. Their presence brings to 18 the total number of women in the Assembly, including 13 Democrats and 5 Republicans. Women now hold 22.5 percent of New Jersey Assembly seats, up from 19.2 percent before the latest appointments. Ranked as low as 43rd in the nation in recent years, New Jersey was 34th before this week.

"County party leaders had the opportunity to make a big difference – and they did it," notes CAWP director Debbie Walsh. "CAWP has pointed out the lack of women in New Jersey politics for three decades, and we've been training women candidates in the state for ten years. It's great to see a positive response from those with the power to create change."

Even more growth is possible because of the record number of women tapped for major party candidacies in the November legislative elections. Forty-four women (29D,15R) are vying for Assembly seats, besting the previous record of 39 set in 2001. Seventeen women (11D, 6R) have senate nominations, topping the previous high of 12 in 2001.
